Management of Novel Respiratory Infections COVID-19 Highlights

For patients with suspect or confirmed COVID-19:

Droplet/Contact Precautions

(Surgical/procedure mask, isolation gown, gloves, eye protection i.e. goggles or faceshield)

EXCEPTION - ICU/IMCU

Droplet/Contact + Airborne Precautions

(Fitted and seal tested N95 mask, face shield, isolation gown, gloves)

<u>Updates</u>

as soon as possible.

The Chief Medical Officer of Health and Ministry of Health provide direction on the management of novel respiratory infections and COVID-19.

Procedures may change as new information becomes available.

Information will be updated and shared

What do you do?

You are caring for a patient who is being investigated for COVID-19 on your unit. They are in a private room and require a nasopharyngeal swab.

Action: Prior to providing this care, don the required Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for Droplet/Contact precautions and proceed with the swab.

What do you do?

You are caring for a patient who has tested positive for COVID-19 on your unit. The physician has ordered airway suction (aerosol-generating medical procedure or AGMP) for this patient.

Action: Don the required PPE for Airborne and Droplet/Contact precautions. Ensure procedure is performed in a negative pressure room, if possible.

What do you do?

You have had exposure to a patient with suspect or confirmed COVID-19 without the use of adequate precautions.

Action: Your care will be managed in collaboration with Occupational Health and Safety and the Thunder Bay District Health Unit.

- 1. What precautions do I use when performing a known or potential AGMP in a negative pressure room?
- Use the Droplet/Contact and Airborne precautions.
- 2. What happens if there are insufficient beds to care for patients?
- Call IPAC to assist in identifying patients who can be cohorted.
