According to the Thunder Bay District Health Unit, Northwestern Ontario proudly boasts a population that is 87.2 percent fully vaccinated with 92.6 percent of our residents having received their first dose. The hard work of our vaccination team has also seen the Hospital reach the top tier of vaccination efforts with an amazing 95.4 percent inoculation rate among staff. We continue to work on educating the unvaccinated on the benefits as we know the double vaccine is currently the best defense against COVID-19.

The number of active COVID-19 cases in our region remains low. Along with being fully vaccinated, consistent adherence to safety protocols is vital to maintaining a safe and healthy environment in our Hospital. All staff, professional staff, volunteers and learners are reminded to complete their entrance screening prior to entering the building before a scheduled shift. Everyone is required to wear appropriate PPE, practice proper hand hygiene and follow physical distancing guidelines.
