Pandemic safety measures will remain in place at our Hospital for the foreseeable future. Masking and entrance screening will be required to enter the Hospital and all satellite buildings for the protection of patients, all health care workers and visitors. Additionally, all staff, professional staff, learners, volunteers, and essential contractors while in our Hospital or any satellite building, must wear a mask and eye protection immediately upon entry until exit and at all times. Masks and eye protection can only be removed if you are in an approved break area when eating, drinking and when able to maintain a distance of 2 m/6 ft or more from others (this includes patients and co-workers) or if you are in a private office or workspace.

Our internal COVID-19 Pandemic Response Level has moved from Grey (Lockdown) to Red (Control). The decision to move to Level Red (Control) is based on multiple factors, such as the more controlled level of patients with COVID-19 in our Hospital, decreasing the size of the COVID-19 unit, a decline in number of cases locally and easing of restrictions provincially. All response activities are evaluated daily by our Hospital's Incident Management Team and Leaders across the organization to ensure they are effective and appropriate. The 'Good Catch' Patient Safety Awards have returned. A 'Good Catch' (or near miss) is an event that could have resulted in harm, but did not reach the patient. Good Catch Awards highlight individuals, groups or departments who demonstrate their commitment to keeping patients safe by reporting a near miss. Recipients will be randomly selected and awarded quarterly for their efforts. Reporting these events strengthen the safety culture of our Hospital and prevent future events from happening.
